

Coming In April!

Locates Without Borders

Tired of placing multiple locate requests because your job is located in more than one city, township, village, or county? Well, soon only a single request is needed when your jobs takes you into more than one place. This change will take place within the first week of April.

How does it work?

Member facility owners will receive your request based solely on the mapped work location and not which city, township, village, or county you indicate on your ticket. So, if you place your tickets with an RTE or Design account, as always, make sure your entire work location is completely covered by the polygon you create on the map.

How do I know which city, township, village, or county to enter on my ticket? You may enter any one of the cities, townships, villages, or counties your work is located in on the request, but be sure to map the entire work location in all places.



It's important to remember, scope of work limitations still apply.

- Each street requires a separate ticket.
- Up to 10 addresses on a ticket as long as they are on the same street, within a mile of each other.
- When working along roads or a cross country route, only one or two miles maximum per request, depending on intersecting roads.



In the first week of April, all Overhead requests should be submitted online. RTE users will notice the Overhead Question gone from the ticket entry screen when this change takes place. If you need to place an overhead request, go to OVERHEAD.MISSDIG811.ORG.

ONE TICKET PER CALL

As of April 1, 2018 MISS DIG 811's Notification Center will only accept one ticket (Locate Request) per phone call.

Placing locate requests online is the best way to avoid long hold times.

There are two ways to place online locate requests: e-Locate & Remote Ticket Entry (RTE).

- e-Locate- For single address requests. This does not require an account or training. You may access it from <u>WWW.MISSDIG811.ORG</u> or <u>ELOCATE.MISSDIG.ORG</u>.
- RTE- For excavators placing locate requests on a daily or weekly basis. An

Be smart when farming near underground pipelines and utilities

A northern Illinois farmer and his son were killed, and another farmworker was severely burned in a natural gas pipeline explosion while installing field tile last fall. According to pipeline company officials, they were unaware of the field work, and the required one-call notification was not provided to the company prior to the work being performed.

Spring means deep tillage, trenching, post hole digging, tile-laying, building and other earthmoving activities on the farm. Be aware of pipeline and utility safety issues and call 811 when needed.

The fact is, underneath much of America's farmland lies buried pipeline and utilities. These utilities may carry natural gas or oil, electricity, communication lines or water. Any one of these utilities struck during a farming operation can cause dangerous consequences for you, your family, tenants, hired hands, your neighbors, your community and the environment, possibly impacting your farm for years.

Make the free call to 811 to get your underground utilities marked every time before you dig. The following <u>digging myths and facts</u> are made available by Enbridge, Inc. through the <u>Pipeline Ag Safety Alliance</u>.

Myth	Fact
811 is only for digging.	811 applies to all dirt-moving activities like deep tilling, ditching, soil ripping, installing drain tile or utilities. It also includes building fences, buildings, roads and berms.
,	The depth of pipelines and other utilities can change over time. Please don't make risky assumptions—you don't want to be the neighbor who knocks out internet, cable or vital services.
	You should always call 811. Like choosing to not text while driving, making a one call may not always be required by law, but it's always the safest option.
If I hit a pipeline and nothing happens, there's nothing to worry about.	Even if it appears the pipeline isn't damaged, always call the pipeline operator. Protective coating damage or even a small dent in the pipeline could cause a major problem in the future.
Calling 811 will hold up my work. I don't have time to call.	Calling 811 is fast. After you call, professional locators will be sent to the proposed excavation site within two to three business days.
Calling 811 costs money. I'm trying to run a successful business, and every dollar counts.	Calling 811 is free—the cost is paid by utility companies to protect you and your employees or tenants.
	The depth of pipelines and other utilities can change over the years due to erosion, digging projects or uneven surfaces. You're not bothering us by calling 811. We'd rather you be safe than sorry.
